

 "Is used to plan and evaluate strategies to prevent illness and as a guide to the management of patients in whom disease has already developed."





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# What is Alzheimer's Disease?

- It is a neurocognitive/neurodegenerative disorder that causes an impairment of intellectual functioning that destroys a person's ability to recall, remember, relate or imagine.
- The Hallmark of ALZ is the accumulation of beta-amyloid plagues outside of the neurons and neurofibrillary tangles (twisted strands of protein) or Tau Proteins inside of the neurons.
- It is a chronic and progressive disease. THERE IS NO CURE

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
OC1 THE AMYLOID induces inflammation in the brain leading to neuronal dysfunction
Hyperphosphorylization of the tea protein disrupts the neuronal microtubules and the anon structure

- T TAU PROTEINS

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- N-NEUROGENERATION
- IDENTIFY VIA: Cerebrospinal Fluid PET Scan

**Genetic Mutation**: Dominantly Inherited Alzheimer's Disease (DIAD)

- Three Major Risk Factors
- AGE

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- GENETICS
- FAMILY HISTORY
- SIX(6) Million Americans are living with ALZ disease



### **AGE**



- Age generally greater than 65 years old
- Increase Risk with Increasing Age
- $\bullet$  Age Alone is NOT the cause of AlZ
- $\bullet$  This is NOT a normal part of aging

Neurodegeneration is linked to cognition and behavior


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




### **FAMILY HISTORY**

- Increased Risk of Developing Alzheimer's Disease if they have a First Degree Relative diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease
- Family History isn't necessary for a person to be diagnosed with the disease





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GRANDPARENTS,
Grandchildren,
and CHILDCARE

Thirty percent (30%) or 3.3 million of
those 5 and younger are in the care of
grandparents at some point every week

Twelve percent or 4.7 million School
Age Children between ages 5 and 14
are cared for by grandparents before
and after school

# **GRANDPARENTS and CAREGIVING**

- Approximately 40% of grandparents that live within an hour's drive from them provide childcare to their grandchildren, especially if the child is under 13 years old
- If the child is under six years old then approximately 64% of grandparents surveyed provide care to their grandchildren




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### Grandchildren Under 18 Years Living with a Grandparent Householder by Grandparent Responsibility and Presence of Parent

- Grandparent householder not responsible for own grandchildren under 18 years

### COST

- ► 2029. 78 million Baby Boomers and 10million Generation X are predicted to have Alzheimer's Disease
- ► Total Health Cost will be at least \$172 billion
- ► Patient Cost:
  - ► Skilled Care 6K/month
  - ► In home Care 3800/month
  - ► Daycare 1500/month
